A young boy was told that the eye of God is always watching us. He thought for a moment and then he said, "I'd like to know what kind of watching it is. Tim Brown watches me in school so he can tell Teacher if I whisper and get me bad marks. But Father watches me in a different way. When I am on the beach, he keeps watch so I won't get in too deep. I like that kind of watching!"

What kind of watching do you believe God is doing in your life? Do you feel that He is waiting for you to make a mistake so He can straighten you out? Or do you believe He is watching to protect you from harm, to keep you from getting into a situation that is over your head?

The perspective we have of God will affect the way we live in every area of our lives. Think about it. Do we dress modestly as a protection against lustful looks or because we seek God's approval? Do we avoid certain kinds of entertainment because God has shown us that keeping our minds clean is for our protection? Or do we stay away because He doesn't want His children associating with sinners? Unless we can relax in the presence of God, we will always feel as if He is checking up on us.

In 2 Chronicles 16:9, we read: "For the eyes of the Lord range throughout the earth to strengthen those whose hearts are fully committed to him."

Does that statement sound as if God is looking for someone to punish or harass? No, of course not! God Himself is saying, "I want

to support you. I want to keep you out of the deep parts of the ocean of life where you will find yourself in over your head. I want to prevent and or to rescue you from drowning."

If we will take notice of God's dealings with the people He used to bring about His purpose, we will see that He didn't hover over them, waiting to catch them in some foul deed. That's not the way of God. Excuse #2 – WORK

Lk. 14:16-18 Jesus replied: "A certain man was preparing a great banquet and invited many guests. 17 At the time of the banquet he sent his servant to tell those who had been invited, 'Come, for everything is now ready.' 18 "But they all alike began to make excuses...19 "Another said, 'I have just bought five yoke of oxen, and I'm on my way to try them out. <u>Please excuse me.</u>'

Again: "Excuse me" meaning "Excuses for me". Here the second poor excuse. According to this excuser, these oxen could not wait; they had to be 'tried out' during the banquet. One fatal flaw in this excuse is: oxen don't expire. Let's categorize this type of excuse as 'work or responsibilities' This kind responsibility can be in different forms. For this person it looks like working with oxen. For you and me, it might look like our jobs, cooking, cleaning, going to the bank, laundry, etc. In the hyperactive world we live in, we could make a list of a thousand things to add to the list; each of which are vying for our time. Usually, getting them done is not an option. However, the question to be answered here is: "When?" We face the same challenge as the excuser above. We can always make the time of responsibilities override the time for the Lord. When the choice to neglect the Lord's time comes we must question ourselves:

- Do I need to do it during services?
 - When I'm late: was it just poor planning? Could I plan better to be on time?
 - If I received a \$1000 for attending 3 service I normally say "I can't", would I make it?
 - Am I willing to change or sacrifice something for my commitment to the Lord?
- Am I missing service, because it's inconvenient?
- Am I only willing to help someone when it's convenient? Am I willing to go out of my way for the Lord?
- Do I have time to serve or am I too busy filled with my own responsibilities?

If the Lord were trying to use you, would you actually have time? Or are you TOO BUSY.

Rom. 12 calls us to be 'living sacrifices'. A sacrifice is not convenient? If all you have to offer is convenient: it is NOT a sacrifice. Jesus' sacrifice was NOT convenient.

Mt. 6:33But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

The Perils and Perks of Prophecy - Part II

Question - Can Christians Study, Consider, and Speak on Prophecy without being in a state of apostasy?

Short Answer – Yes, We don't need a full picture, and should get used to not having all answers on prophecy if the Disciples, Apostles, Prophets, and Mary are good examples. Thousands of years passed by with prophets, priests, and followers of God wondering what was to come-having choppy information. Jesus' best students often held personal, inaccurate, or erroneous ideas concerning Messiah - ideas that only believers would consider. This didn't make them evil, it made them seekers of God. 2 Peter 1 – "For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive..... We also have the prophetic message....and you will do well to pay attention to it... until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts." This amazing passage ties prophecies of the past with those of the future. They point to the second coming! Read the whole chapter with open eyes and heart. Continuity of Prophecy in the N.T.

Believers Engaged with Prophecy Despite Struggle and Info.

MARY - Luke – 2:19 "But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart." Mary knew she birthed Christ, <u>but</u> <u>didn't understand what she just saw - nor everything</u> prophesied for His life. It is HIGHLY likely she held the same view of a militant Messiah as His disciples. She took time to process. Her flaws and errant view also came out when she rebuked Him in youth.

PAUL - Eph. 5:32 – "This is a <u>profound mystery</u>--but I am talking about Christ and the church." **1 Cor. 13:12** "For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror.... <u>now I know in part;</u> then I shall know fully.. In this amazing passage Paul speaks of things he doesn't fully understand under the Spirit, and doesn't hinder his comment as he commanded with tongues (1Cor.14:28). Keep this in mind with prophecy– we only have snippets of info, and can engage intellect.

PETER - Matthew 16:22 - Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. "Never, Lord!"..."This shall never happen to you!" Peter had a very errant view of prophecy and Christ – this didn't make him an apostate, it made him a believer seeking Christ and desiring a Messiah. Satan used Peter's "absolutes" to tempt Christ.

JESUS - Matthew 13:17 "For truly I tell you, many prophets and <u>righteous people longed to see</u>...and to hear what you hear..." Permission for the righteous to ponder is granted. Jesus also spoke on the "last days" while at the same time saying he didn't even know when it was coming. He still offered information though.

Think on this. We are at least given permission to talk about prophecy and what the bible says of the future ...Carefully.

The Joy of the Lord in the Midst of Sorrow

Joyful Christians are not immune to life's events that cause sorrow. We do experience the suffering of pain, loss, hardship, and grief. Peter acknowledges this when he says in 1 Peter 1:6 that salvation "brings you great joy, although you may have to suffer for a short time in various trials." So do we lose our joy in these times of sorrow? Absolutely not!

We may be tempted to sink into discouragement, or a sad, unhappy frame of mind, but James encourages us to "Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds" (James 1:2). He tells us that this suffering is a test of our faith and we should be joyful knowing that this test will cause us to grow in endurance and be stronger Christians because of it. As Christians we practice to be joyful at times like these because of our love and trust in Christ. Let us not be weak and turn away from God in times of sorrow. We must take courage in the fact that God knows best and has our best interest at heart, so in the midst of our sorrow we praise Him as the matchless God.

Our greatest example of the proper reaction to suffering is Jesus himself. He endured agony and shame without a negative word. We are told in Hebrews 12:2-3 that Jesus, "For the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame." We should, therefore, consider his endurance and follow his example so that we "will not grow weary and lose heart" when we are faced with suffering. Jesus himself encouraged his disciples, "you have sorrow now, but I will see you again, and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy away from you."

When we are faced with or experiencing sorrow, let us meet the challenge to "Rejoice in the Lord always" (Philippians 4:4); let us not allow the devil to use sorrow to steal our joy.
