After leaving home my grandmother would write me often and at the end of each letter she would write the encouraging words- "You can make it!", "One day at a time."

Just a few encouraging words at the end of a letter, but great words to live by. I guess my grandma is in good company because Abraham Lincoln once said - "People are as happy as they make up their minds to be." There's no doubt that our happiness is tied directly to our mindset. As Christians we're striving to allow God's word to transfer our hearts mind and help us become the people God wants us to be.

Recently, we studied the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus said- Mat 6:34- "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about its own things. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble." There is no difficulty, no circumstance, no problems which cannot be handled one day at a time. Failure to learn this lesson causes many people to remain troubled, miserable and unhappy. They live either in the past or in the future and try to mix them up with the present which is a recipe for unhappiness.


Many of us live in the past, whether we realize it or not. We regret things in the past. All of us have made mistakes. All of us have sinned. (Rom.3:23). Everyone has done things for which he or she is and should feel ashamed for. We're challenged to ask God to forgive us, and then we must forgive ourselves and forget these things. Alan Bryan, in his book, Climb Happiness Hill tells of a friend man who couldn't seem to fully enjoy what he had because, at one time, he had accumulated \$ 20,000 to 25,000 and made an investment that failed. Through the years he

frequently referred to that loss he had suffered. He would talk about how he had lost that money and would say he wished he had it to spend again. Finally, one day he told him, "You didn't just lose \$20,000; you lost more than \$20 million. "What do you mean?" the man replied. Alan told him, "You have lost that \$20,000 so many times because you are living in the past. You have lost it again and again. It keeps you from enjoying things in the present because you are constantly letting your mind dwell on that one mistake." He failed to learn that we cannot, we absolutely cannot, live in the past.

Remember the good things from the past, not only about ourselves but about others, also. Don't remember and dwell on the foolish things. All of us have done foolish things. Don't remember the mistakes you have made; we have all made mistakes. Sins of the past should be repented of and washed clean by the blood of the Lamb. Remember, the good things you have done; the good things you have said, and ask God, of course, to forgive you for your mistakes. We can correct our mistakes the best we can, and quickly as we can, and then bury them forever.

Thank God with His help, we can learn to live one day at a time, counting our blessings along the way. We can truly find joy in each and every day as the Psalmist says-(Ps. 118:24) - This is the day the LORD has made; We will rejoice and be glad in it.

"Oh my G_d"

It is a phrase uttered to fill space, express surprise, fill gaps in-between curse words, or just have something to say.

Exodus 20:7/Deuteronomy 5:11 "You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God, for **the LORD will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses His name.** The Hebrew word "vain," שוֹאָה "shav" translates to "emptiness of speech." Fully meaning "to misuse."

For thousands of years this was understood to be taken so seriously that some scholars refrained from evoking the name of God in writing, instead substituting "my lords" for YAHWEY. Since this habit has become akin to profanities or word filler, there are those who have tried to reframe scripture to say that this really means something different... like living in a way that misrepresents your Christianity. They claim God would not possibly send someone to hell for habitual meaningless use of His name. Taking for granted the value of Christian living, may I suggest this to be a false doctrine? I would go so far as to suggest you would be better using **any** swear word than you would be saying "Oh my G_d" or any other empty invocation. God said none of us lives worthy of Him (1 John 1:8, Romans 3:23), *but despite this He clearly says you are not excused in the matter of His respect. What we esteem the world does not.* Do you feel more offended hearing that phrase than raw cursing? *You should*, and if not, there is something very wrong with your reverence for God. I would highly recommend stopping this habit, and that we strongly admonish those in our household who dare utter it in casual irreverence. It is non-negotiable.

It was Jesus that said if you call someone "good for nothing" (whom He gave His life for) that He might cast you into hell Himself. **It was Jesus** that said He would not forgive you if you dare blaspheme the Holy Spirit (above His and the Father's name), and **it was Jesus**, whom when He taught us how to pray, said **"Hallowed be Thy name"** ("I treat Your name holy." NOT "I live a good Christianity that honors Your name." See the difference?)

So – do you intend to invoke the attention of a being so powerful as to make the universe by His word? Do you want to invoke your Creator's gaze during conversation or use His name as a space filler? Back to the basics – if you do this, tell Him you are sorry – and STOP. There is no excuse for you as a believer, and He will hold you accountable

The Joy of the Lord (II)

It is an interesting fact that **God commands us to be joyful.** He said, "Be joyful always" (1 Thessalonians 5:16). Last week we noted that the joy God commands is spiritual, it is a fruit of the spirit (Galatians 5:22), and therefore it comes from God – it is "the joy of the Lord" (Nehemiah 8:10). How can we obey this command? How can we get joy that is "of the Lord"?

David declared in Psalm 19: 8 **"The precepts of the Lord are right, giving joy to the heart,"** and in Psalm 119: 111, **"Your statutes are my heritage forever; they are the joy of my heart."** David lets us know that we can find joy in God's commandments. Reading God's word and understanding his principles of righteousness can make us joyful, because when we know what is right and practice it, we will *be* right. When we study these right principles and have them in our hearts as a foundation for our character and behavior, we are building a foundation for joyful hearts and joyful lives. It will also give us joy to know that we are pleasing God by learning and doing his commandments.

Jeremiah had more to say on the process of how God's Word brings us joy. He said, **"When your words came, I ate them; they were my joy and my heart's delight..."** (Jeremiah 15:16). The prophet uses a metaphor to show how he treated and appreciated the words of God. We all know what it is like to really enjoy a meal. We have experienced the pleasure and the satisfaction of eating something we like. So also Jeremiah treated God's words – he ate (processed and digested) them, and he received a similar result, he experienced joy, and the words became his heart's delight.

From David and Jeremiah we learn that one way to obey God's command to be joyful is to read His words, treasure them, keep them in our hearts, and obey them. Knowing and doing what is right – "the precepts of the Lord are right" – can be a source of perpetual joy for us.
